

ABSTRACT

The interior redesign of the Office of Housing, Settlement Areas, and Land Affairs (Disperkimta) of South Tangerang City was initiated in response to the need for a workspace that supports employee activities in terms of function, comfort, and efficiency. With a complex organizational structure and diverse tasks across departments, the interior design must go beyond technical standards and address the real spatial needs of its users. The design process began with direct observation of existing conditions and user activity patterns, followed by analysis of spatial shortcomings. These findings were developed into zoning strategies, spatial layouts, thematic concepts, and interior elements designed to encourage interaction, collaboration, flexibility, and privacy. An activity-based approach was applied to ensure that the design reflects actual work patterns and enhances long-term employee productivity. This redesign is expected to serve as a reference for the development of functional, adaptive, and human-centered government office interiors.
